Context: Madison, WI



Dane County Population: 536,000

City of Madison Population: 255,000

Kids under age 5 = 30,300

9% (2,718) experiencing poverty



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EDUCATION

- Children are cared for and have fun as they become prepared for school.
- Students succeed academically and graduate from high school prepared for college, career and community.

INCOME

- More people are on pathways out of poverty.
- There is a decrease in family homelessness.

HEALTH

- Reduce racial health disparities in Dane County.
- Increase resiliency and trauma supports for Dane County residents.



2GEN (MULTIGENERATIONAL APPROACH)

Build family well-being by intentionally and simultaneously working with children under five and the adults in the their lives together.

Education: Born Learning Strategies

- 1. Parents supported in how to be their child's first teacher.
- 2. Holistic family supports focused on 13 geographic areas.
- Children screened for developmental delays, families receive support for potential delays. (ASQ data sharing and referral)
- 4. Community of practice to support professionals Home Visitors.
- 5. Healthcare professionals knowledgeable and connected to community supports.




